#### JOINT OPENING COMMENTS OF THE SAN FRANCISCO MUNICIPAL TRANSPORTATION AGENCY, SAN FRANCISCO INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT, AND SAN FRANCISCO COUNTY TRANSPORTATION AUTHORITY ON THE PROPOSED DECISION REQUIRING TRANSPORTATION NETWORK COMPANIES TO SUBMIT THEIR ANNUAL REPORTS FOR THE YEARS 2014-2019 TO THE COMMISSION WITH LIMITED REDACTIONS

Pursuant to California Public Utilities Commission Rule of Practice and Procedure 14.3(a), the San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency and the San Francisco International Airport, (collectively "the City"), and the San Francisco County Transportation Authority (together, the "City and County") submit these Joint Opening Comments on the Proposed Decision Requiring Transportation Network Companies to Submit Their Annual Reports for the Years 2014-2019 to the Commission with Limited Redactions (the "Proposed Decision") filed by the California Public Utilities Commission (the "Commission" or "CPUC") on September 30, 2022.

#### I. INTRODUCTION

The City and County support the Proposed Decision and reserve the right to respond to the opening comments submitted by other parties in this proceeding. The Proposed Decision follows what is becoming a long line of decisions and rulings in this proceeding which have found that the Transportation Network Companies ("TNCs") have failed to carry their burden of proving that the balance of trip data at issue in the Annual Reports is exempt from disclosure and which have upheld the public's right to access the data in the Annual Reports.<sup>1</sup> The City and County applauds this newest addition to the line of decisions and rulings upholding the people's right of access and support the consistency with which the Commission has addressed the arguments repeatedly advanced by the TNCs to shield the data in the Annual Reports from disclosure. The City and County urge the Commission to adopt the Proposed Decision and to adopt the minor recommended changes discussed below.

### **II. DISCUSSION**

## A. The Proposed Decision Should be Amended to Reverse the Order in which the 2014-2019 Annual Reports are Submitted by the TNCs.

The City and County appreciate the schedule for disclosure that the Proposed Decision provides for the submission of the 2014-2019 Annual Reports.<sup>2</sup> However, we would recommend reversing the order in which the retroactive reports are submitted, so that the public receives the more recent year's report first.<sup>3</sup> More recent reports are of greater public interest and policy relevance, and can be used to evaluate recent trends. In total it will be 18 months after the decision is adopted for all of the reports to be released. This will create a gap in the record during that interim period unless the order in which the reports are required to be submitted is reversed. For this reason, the City and County respectfully request that the order in which the 2014-2019 Annual Reports are submitted by the TNCs to the Commission be reversed, with the schedule starting with the 2019 Annual Reports.

# **B.** The Proposed Decision Should Clarify that the Annual Reports Should Be Made Available to the Public on the Commission Website.

The City and County encourage all efforts and mechanisms that support the prompt and efficient release of the Annual Reports. To this end, the City and County recommend that the Commission clarify that the public versions of TNC Annual Reports can be made directly available on the Commission website. Uploading the Annual Reports to Commission website instead of requiring the public to submit duplicative public records requests would increase the efficiency with which the public receive the Annual Reports and would reduce administrative burden for Commission staff. Further, making the Annual Reports publicly available on the Commission website is consistent with how the Commission provides required reporting data to the public in this proceeding and in related proceedings. For instance, required Autonomous Vehicle ("AV") quarterly reporting data is available directly on the Commission website.<sup>4</sup> As is the data submitted by TNCs in support of their advice

letters in the Access for All proceeding, R-19-02-012.<sup>5</sup> The City and County strongly recommend that release of the Annual Reports follow the practice in the aforementioned contexts, and that the Proposed Decision be modified to clarify that the Consumer Protection and Enforcement Division staff should post the Annual Reports on the Commission's website.

## III. CONCLUSION

As stated above, prior rulings issued in this proceeding, notably the 2020 and 2021 Confidentiality Rulings, have found the TNC's confidentiality arguments largely unavailing, and have upheld the public disclosure of the reports under D.20-03-014, subject to limited redactions. Yet, due to the continued pressing of claims<sup>6</sup> which have been comprehensively considered and repeatedly rejected by the assigned Administrative Law Judge and the Commission,<sup>7</sup> the public has yet to gain access to all of the Annual Report data which the Commission has ruled the public entitled.<sup>8</sup> In order to serve the legitimate public interests which have been well-documented in this proceeding,<sup>9</sup> the City and County urge the Commission adopt the Proposed Decision with the City and County's recommended changes and to deal swiftly with any appeals or other efforts which seek to block the decision's effect.
