The proposed no parking zone would provide maneuvering clearance for eastbound traveling Muni buses.

Folsom Street at 5th Street – Bike Share Station

Folsom Street, south side, from 235 feet to 340 feet east of 5th Street (105-foot bike share station in the parking lane) (Supervisor District 6) ♦ Laura Stonehill, laura.stonehill@sfmta.com

Proposing a temporary Bay Wheels bike share station on the south side of Folsom Street in the parking lane adjacent to 855 Folsom Street while the 5th Street Improvement Project is under construction, expected through March 2020.

Haight Street at Lyon Street – Bike Share Station

Proposing a Bay Wheels bike share station on the sidewalk on the south side of Haight Street, adjacent to Buena Vista Park

Folsom Street at 7th Street – Bike Share Station

17. ESTABLISH – NO STOPPING EXCEPT BICYCLES ESTABLISH – BIKE SHARE STATION

Folsom Street, south side, from 41 feet to 92 feet west of 7th Street (51-foot bike share station in the floating parking lane) (Supervisor District 6) ♦ Laura Stonehill, laura.stonehill@sfmta.com

Proposing a Bay Wheels bike share station on the south side of Folsom Street in the floating parking lane adjacent to Valvoline Oil Change.

• Items denoted with an asterisk (*) can be given approval by the City Traffic Engineer after the public hearing. Otherwise, the SFMTA Board will make the final approval at a later date based on the outcome at the public hearing.



California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Appeal Rights under Chapter 31 of the San Francisco Administrative Code: For Approval Actions, the Planning Department has issued a CEQA exemption determination or negative declaration, which may be viewed online at http://www.sf-planning.org/index.aspx?page=3447. Following approval of the item by the SFMTA City Traffic Engineer, the CEQA determination is subject to appeal within the time frame specified in S.F. Administrative Code Section 31.16, typically within 30 calendar days of the Approval Action. For information on filing a CEQA appeal, contact the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors at City Hall, 1 Dr. Carlton B. Goodlett Place, Room 244, San Francisco, CA 94102, or call (415) 554-5184. Under CEQA, in a later court challenge, a litigant may be limited to raising only those issues previously raised at a hearing on the project or in written correspondence delivered to the Board of Supervisors or other City board, commission or department at, or prior to, such hearing, or as part of the appeal hearing process on the CEQA decision.

Whether the City Traffic Engineer's decision is considered a Final SFMTA Decision is determined by Division II, Section 203 of the Transportation Code. If the City Traffic Engineer approves a parking or traffic modification, this decision is considered a Final SFMTA Decision. If a City Traffic Engineer disapproves a parking or traffic modification and a member of the public requests SFMTA review of that decision, the additional review shall be conducted pursuant to Division II, Section 203 of the Transportation Code. City Traffic Engineer decisions will be posted on https://www.sfmta.com/committees/engineering-public-hearings by 5 p.m. on the Friday following the public hearing. Final SFMTA Decisions involving certain parking or traffic modifications, whether made by the City Traffic Engineer or the SFMTA Board, can be reviewed by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to Ordinance 127-18.
