PAID PARKING



- In areas requiring more turnover
- Mixed-use/commercial areas
- High density residential
- Pay for time used
- Pay by coin/card/phone

UNREGULATED PARKING



- Vehicle storage
- Move only for street-cleaning
- Reduces availability
- Least amount of turnover
- Circling for parking/congestion

Parking Management Approaches

Parking Management Approaches

RESIDENTIAL PERMIT PARKING



- Limits free parking to 2 hours
- Residents w/permits exempt
- Typically enforced 8AM-6PM
- Renewed annually
- 1-day permits for visitors

PAID OR PERMIT PARKING (NEW)



- No time limits; pay for needed time
- Residents w/permits exempt
- Pay by phone/card/coin
- No need for 1-day permits for visitors
- Provides greatest flexibility
