5. Report of the Chair (For discussion only)

Chair Leifer welcomed everyone back for the new year. Vice Chair Arvin gave an update on the Muni Funding Working Group.

PUBLIC COMMENT:

Edward Mason discussed road taxes as part of a congestion pricing plan.

6. Public Comment

Edward Mason suggested a medallion charge for access to the publicly owned red curbs, Muni bus stops, and restricted access to the white zones.



stated that in 2010, then Mayor Newsom, facing a budget shortfall, instructed SF MTA to monetize the relatively free taxi medallions. For 500 buses, it would come out to be \$125 million if the SFNTA charged each commuter shuttle bus a medallion fee of \$250,000.

Mark Gruberg with the San Francisco Taxi Workers alliance stated that in the taxi world, the taxi medallion sales program has proved to be the biggest disaster in the history of the industry. He stated that the program started in 2010 and none have been sold since 2016 because nobody in their right mind would invest that much money in an asset that is worthless. He said a lot of that has to do with Uber and Lyft, but it also has to do with City policy that allowed Uber and Lyft to operate freely and, at that time, illegally, as taxi companies.

Edward Mason discussed bicycle license fees from the 60s. He stated that the amount of money that has been spent on the Valencia Street Bikeway Project is aggravating. Pedestrian safety is now in jeopardy on the sidewalk because of all the micro mobility that is present.

The SFMTA CAC supports the Biking and Rolling Plan, but recommends the agency find additional opportunities to implement separated biking and rolling lanes rather than shared lanes. Moreover, we recommend that the agency reevaluate the definition of the "all ages and abilities" network to a higher standard.

CAC MOTION 250206.02

The SFMTA CAC cannot endorse any service cut scenario and urges the SFMTA to exhaust all other options–including seeking additional funds from the Mayor and Board of Supervisors–before reducing Muni service, for the following reasons:

- Transit service cuts have the hardest impact on those with the least options
- Muni ridership has been steadily growing for the past three years, and service cuts would impede this recovery
- Suspending bus lines that were only recently reinstated would damage trust in the SFMTA in affected communities
- Eliminating bus service along corridors or ending bus service at 7pm would make the city less accessible for people with disabilities
- Increasing wait times on some of the city's most popular bus lines would make transit more crowded and less appealing, leading riders to choose other modes of transportation
- Ending Muni Metro service at 10pm would harm recovery of the city's beleaguered downtown economy
- Muni service cuts would impede efforts to raise additional funding at the ballot
