

Q: How much does it cost to ride?


A: Rides on special vehicles leaving from this event are free today.

Q: Are the cable cars or F Line streetcars free today?


A: Cable cars, F Line streetcars and any other Muni vehicle in regular service cost the standard Muni fare.

Q: How long are the rides?


A: All of the special rides are roundtrip. Streetcar rides take about an hour, buses take around 30 minutes. Travel times vary, so budget time accordingly and enjoy the ride!

Q: Can I get on an historic bus while it is parked?

A: Sure, if the doors are open hop on and take a look inside.
