Chair Eaken shared that she attended the Juneteenth parade, thanked staff, and encouraged others attend next year.

Director Tumlin shared about Valencia Street, the Dolores Street, provided a state legislation update, shared about the autonomous vehicles hearing delay to August 10, the SFCTA shuttle pilot, and MuniSafe Day Out.

Barnett Trzcinski expressed concern about construction protocol, sharing that it was broken.

Aleta Dupree commented on autonomous vehicles (AVs), sharing that they provide discrimination-free transportation.

Jordan Smith shared about a recent experience with an AV and expressed concern about safety.

Stacey Randecker expressed concern about Vision Zero and pedestrian deaths, asking the SFMTA what changes have been made to prevent speeding.

Parker Day expressed concern about the size and safety of the bike boxes on Valencia Street.

Aaron Leifer, Citizens' Advisory Council Chair, provided the report.

9. Public Comment

Members of the public may address the SFMTA Board of Directors on matters that are within the Board's jurisdiction and are not on today's calendar.

Alex Lantsberg shared about a recent report, the San Francisco Muni Electrification Alternatives Analysis by the Climate + Community Project.

Rishi Misra expressed concern about pedestrian safety and shared about his pedestrian/vehicle accident.

Eleana Binder expressed opposition to parking restrictions on Winston Drive and shared that the SFMTA should work with the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing (HSH).

Flo Kelly expressed concern about meeting agendas and the remote public comment time limit.

Jordan Smith expressed concern about Winston Drive and shared about his experience living in his vehicle as a student and getting towed.

Sheba expressed opposition to parking restrictions on Winston Drive and urged the Board to work with HSH to support the community's needs.

Kayla Smith expressed opposition to parking restrictions on Winston Drive and urged the SFMTA to give the community a chance.

Paul Neilson expressed opposition to parking restrictions anywhere in the city until the housing crisis is dealt with.

Ian James expressed opposition to parking restrictions on Winston Drive and anywhere around San Francisco State University.

Javier Bremond expressed concern about Winston Drive and the lack of addressing homelessness.

Alberto Buchanan expressed concern about parking restrictions on Winston Drive and urged the Board to think twice before making a decision.



Jessica Hernandez expressed opposition to parking restrictions on Winston Drive and shared that families are already facing significant challenges.

Rodrigo shared about living on Winston Drive and expressed opposition to parking restrictions.

Susan Cietat shared that parking restrictions on Winston Drive would make life harder for those already struggling and urged the SFMTA to look at the benefits versus the harms.

Aleta Dupree commented on her experience using Muni.

Jessica shared about living in a recreational vehicle (RV) and expressed concern about not having a place to live.

Janet Soto shared that Winston Drive was the only place she could live and expressed concern about the 4-hour parking restriction.

Speaker shared that many people live in RVs on Winston Drive because of the pandemic and loss of jobs.

Jamila shared about living on Winston Drive for the last 10 years and urged the SFMTA for assistance to move to a safe place.

Lisette urged the Board to vote against parking restrictions on Winston Drive, sharing that people residing on the street do not pose any issues.

David Pilpel expressed opposition to the 10-minute time limit, requested a discussion item on automated vehicle technologies, and acknowledged Annette Williams' recent retirement.

Barry Taranto expressed concern about the efficiency of the agency's taxi division, sharing about a recent weekend at Oracle Park.

Stacey Randecker urged the SFMTA to push back on other agencies to provide more housing and expressed support for others attending and commenting at the meeting.

Eric McDonnell expressed opposition to parking restrictions on Winston Drive and Buckingham Way.

Following approval of the item by the SFMTA Board, the CEQA determination is subject to appeal within the time frame specified in S.F. Administrative Code Section 31.16 which is typically within 30 calendar days. For information on filing a CEQA appeal, contact the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors at City Hall, 1 Dr. Carlton B. Goodlett Place, Room 244, San Francisco, CA 94102, or call 415.554.5184. Under CEQA, in a later court challenge, a litigant may be limited to raising only those issues previously raised at a hearing on the project or submitted in writing to the City prior to or at such hearing, or as part of the appeal hearing process on the CEQA decision.
