

## SPEED SAFETY CAMERAS

Progress Update

#### **ASSEMBLY BILL 645**

- Authorizes local departments of transportation of six cities to establish a speed safety program— not police departments
- Establishes a 5-year pilot through January 1, 2032
- Driver must be traveling at least 11
   MPH over the speed limit to receive a citation
- The number of cameras is limited based on the city's population: San Francisco gets 33 cameras

Implementation 2025

- 30-Day Public Education Campaign
- 33 Cameras Deployed
- 60-Day Warning Period



**Evaluation** 2026 - 2031

- Data Collection and Evaluation
- 18-Month Assessment
- Final Report to Legislature

### **SYSTEM PLANNING WORK - IN PROGRESS**

Establish Outreach

- Initiate outreach to community organizations focusing on privacy protection, economic justice, and racial equity
- Inform stakeholders of new program
- Draft Speed Safety System Use Policy and System Impact Report

Scope the Program

- Complete interviews with peer cities operating speed camera programs
- Determine appropriate contract mechanisms to operate speed cameras
- Establish legislative process (MTAB, COIT, BOS)


Conduct initial location screening for speed cameras (65 locations identified)

Identify Locations

- Gather detailed speed data for screened locations
- Finalize 33 camera locations
