

Hey Alexandria and other Expansioneers,

Reporting back from my meeting with Sup Peskin earlier this week -- After a lengthy critique of scootershare, he said he felt completely opposite about bikeshare, and said we were doing a better job about keeping bikes relatively corralled. When I showed him the citation heat maps, he mentioned he likes the idea of more stations, but also realizes there is a lot of complicated dynamics with the public when trying to push for more stations, both with residents and commercial folks.

Ultimately, he said he was fine with proceeding with outreach, and wasn't sure how it would go, but he felt more comfortable with the proposed sites in commercial areas over residential, and he said some of the spots in North Beach would likely be more complicated. He also suggested he wasn't as concerned about unfounded bike rental concerns, and was fine with recommendations on Bay or North Point.

Let's chat more about it next week. Happy Friday.



Hello Sunny,

It's been awhile. I hope you're doing well. I'm reaching out with instructive data we've collected related to bikeshare usage in D3.

Since installing stations closer to the Fisherman's Wharf area, we've seen predictable benefits in people parking bikes at docks, reducing misparking instances. To be honest, this isn't surprising since it's cheaper to park at, or near, a station.

On the other hand, in areas without station coverage, we are still seeing misparking. Here's a heat map demonstrating how this looks. On the street, people see a misparked bike; they report it; then SFMTA investigates and issues a citation. But from a broader scope, you can see how citations tend to occur where we have gaps in the system.



With that in mind, we've been considering how to fill these gaps with new potential stations.

- North Point/Columbus south side of North Point, east of Columbus, in the parking lane
- North Pont/Taylor north side of North Point, east of Taylor, in the parking lane
- Bay/Mason south side of Bay, west of Mason, in the parking lane
- Chestnut/Columbus north side of Chestnut, east of Columbus, in the parking lane or Francisco/Columbus- north side of Francisco, east of Columbus, in the parking lane
- Greenwich/Mason north side of Greenwich, west of Mason, in the parking lane
- Vallejo/Columbus north side of Vallejo, west of Columbus, in the parking lane



Of course, the first step is to ask you and Sup Peskin how you feel about these, which is why we're reaching out. Next, we'd open up discussions with the Bike Rental Companies since some of these stations are close to their operations.

Finally, it's helpful to remember data shows demand already exists here. Bike trips already start and end in these areas without stations. The addition of stations would simply help organize the bikes better.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION:

The San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency (SFMTA) proposes to implement a city-wide bicycle sharing system in San Francisco as part of the regional Bay Area Bicycle Share (BABS) system described in detail below. The current regional bicycle share system in San Francisco is a pilot project managed by the Bay Area Air Quality Management District (BAAQMD). The regional BABS system will transfer to the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) for program oversight at the end of 2015. As part of a BABS pilot project initiated on August 29, 2013, the system operator installed approximately 35 bicycle share stations with input from the SFMTA, comprising 350 bicycles within the public right-of-way, located generally in the northeast section of the City. The proposed project would maintain and upgrade the existing 35 pilot bicycle share stations, and expand the BABS system within San Francisco to comprise a total of approximately 450 stations and 4,500 bicycles across the City and County of San Francisco (San Francisco).

DETERMINATION:

The City and County of San Francisco decided to carry out or approve the project on December 18, 2015. The San Francisco Board of Supervisors (BOS) approved a coordination agreement with the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC), other local partners in the East and South Bay, and the bicycle share operator to carry out the Bay Area Bicycle Share Program, which would be overseen in San Francisco by the San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency (SFMTA) on December 8, 2015. The agreement was provided to Mayor Lee for his signature and becomes effective upon signing or when ten days have passed. A copy of documents related to this action may be examined at the San Francisco Board of Supervisors, City Hall, 1 Carlton B. Goodlett Place Room 244, San Francisco, CA, 94102 in File Number 151144.

This project in its approved form has been determined to be exempt from environmental review because it would result in the installation of up to 450 bicycle sharing stations throughout San Francisco, primarily within the public right-of-way and on some parcels. The proposed individual stations are portable, modular, and would be solar and battery powered, and would thus not involve excavation or utility connections. The bicycle sharing station equipment is small in scale and massing relative to surrounding buildings or sites. Bicycle facilities and infrastructure are common sights within the urban environment. There would be no potential for significant environmental impacts at either a project or cumulative level. Therefore, the proposed project would be exempt from environmental review under Class 3.
